A Salvadorian Dish

Pupusas are a Salvadorian food that are made of cheese, beans or meat, or beans and masa. They are very easy to make! Here is the recipe:

For the masa you need Maseca (a form of corn flour) and a stuffing, such as Monterey or mozzarella cheese or refried beans. I personally like spinach and cheese. When you are preparing the masa (maseca) you just need warm water to get it to the right consistency, make sure is not to swaggering. After you have your masa ready make a type of thick tortilla and add the filling to it. Fold it inn half and continue making your tortilla. Heat a well-greased skillet over medium-high flame. Cook each pupusa for about 1 to 2 minutes on each side, until lightly browned and it starts to bubble. Remove to a plate and keep warm until all pupusas are done.

After you're done making the pupusas you can make a topping to go on top of it called Curtido (coleslaw).

Instructions for the Curtido:

1/2 medium green cabbage, shredded

2 carrots, shredded

1 red onion, thinly sliced

1 white onion, thinly sliced

11/2 cups cider vinegar

1 cup water

1/2 teaspoon dried Mexican oregano leaves, crushed

1/2 teaspoon crushed red pepper flakes

1/2 tablespoon salt

Put shredded cabbage, carrots, and sliced onions in a bowl. Bring a pot of water to a boil, and pour the water into the bowl with cabbage, onions, and carrots. Cover bowl for 10 minutes. In a glass jar, add vinegar and salt, spices and water. After 10 minutes, drain the vegetables and add them to the glass jar. Seal the jar and shake.



I miss the sea because I could see it every day. I miss the landscape...the trees, hills, and little old colorful towns everywhere, each with their own personality.
